



## ACT OF INCORPORATION ANNO DECIMO OCTAVO VICTORIAE REGINAE

An Act to Incorporate Saint Paul's College,  
as a College within the University of  
Sydney (Assented to 1<sup>st</sup> December, 1854).

This Act provided that when the Governor was satisfied that £10,000 had been subscribed for the institution and endowment of the College, and that a Warden and six Senior Fellows for the government of the institution had been appointed and elected, he was to notify this by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*. On the issuing of the Proclamation the Warden and Fellows of St Paul's College would be constituted a Body Politic and Corporate and enabled to receive a grant of land from the University.

To mark the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Assent given this Act by the Governor of New South Wales, Sir Charles Fitzroy, a Luncheon was hosted at College on the 1<sup>st</sup> December last by the Warden and Fellows. The guests were all Old Paulines who were at least half the age of the College.

Many travelled hundreds of kilometres to be there and all had to brave the 40°C temperature on the day. Drinks were taken in the Junior Common Room before Luncheon in Hall which was beautifully decorated by our Housekeeper, Katharine Coorey. After being formally welcomed by the Warden the guests enjoyed magnificent medallions of veal with prociutto, sage and provolone cheese and vegetables, followed by summer berry pudding. Justice Lloyd Waddy proposed the toast to The Queen and Justice Henric Nicholas, as Chairman of the College Council, proposed the toast to the College. He spoke largely of great friendships forged here and the loyalty inspired by the ethos of the place which touches all who come here. He highlighted the growth of the College from the time of the Great War when there were only about 20 men in residence, to the building of the Arnott Wing in 1962 when numbers were about 180. The huge influence of Canon Arthur Garnsey (Warden 1916-44) and Dr Felix Arnott (Warden 1946-63) so well known and loved by generations of Paulines was carefully detailed. Also mentioned with great affection were Miss Hart (Matron) and Mary and Gertie from the kitchen who all gave long and committed service to College. The Warden responded to this toast with an air of thankfulness for the past upon which the future is made secure. "Today,...as a metaphor we are invited to run the plough over old fields, to find, enhance and renew our identity with reference to things of the intellect, the spirit and the heart – as expressed distinctively and for so long, in this College and its motto, *Deo Patriae Tibi*.." He too spoke warmly of the enduring influence of Arthur Garnsey and Felix Arnott who "...was profoundly intellectual, deeply loved and the right man to lead the College from tough post-WWII years through to 1963. Apparently *I have never seen a Paul's man drunk* was his personal motto." In conclusion he said: "Paulines led by the

Robert Alberts and other good men and true, ensure that this 1856 living College does not become more sand than sandstone. I hope, as the present Warden, that our Sesquicentenary will draw Paulines of every age together in a fitting celebration of this great College – shared in common and carried as 'our tradition' that we renew and hand on."





EDINBURGH MILITARY  
TATTOO, SYDNEY 2005

During the Edinburgh Military Tattoo the Head Office of the Tattoo was located in the conference room of the Albert Wing. Most of the bands and visiting service personnel stayed in the colleges of Sydney University. At St Paul's were The Band of HM Scots Guards, The Band of HM Royal Marines Scotland, The Central Band of the Royal Air Force, The Queen's Colour Squadron, The Musical Director of the New Zealand Army Band, Officers of HM Kongens Garde (King's Guard) of Norway, Royal Gurkha Rifles and a number of Staff Officers. Of the 40 in the Scots Guards 3 were women who were well hidden in their red jackets and bearskins.

The first dress rehearsal was held on the College oval (the cricket pitch covered with 3cm thick plastic matting) and daily we were treated to musical offerings and precision marching. **Tim Schwilk** was Lord Keeper of the Beer Barrels in Salisbury Castle during their stay and was hard pressed to keep up the supply; Australian beer proved more popular than Scotch Whisky. The Norwegian boys were quite young as they were doing their year of National Service and had only been in the King's Guard for 8 weeks. For new recruits their drill was amazing. They arrived as white as sheets and left with suntans after getting sunburnt on Day One and calling for 60 white hats from Gowings. These lucky fellows are later going to a Tattoo in Nova Scotia. College staff found our visitors used to keeping their rooms tidy; could that be a hint? Guarding the Guards were truckloads of Military and NSW Police, including the Dog Squad; and College staff grew used to wearing security tags.

## David Drury, Director of Music

In 2004, David Drury marked his 13<sup>th</sup> year as Director of Music & 11<sup>th</sup> year as Licensee (of The Salisbury) at St. Paul's College. Although the Chapel Choir is his main contribution to College, his professional life is mainly spent on the wider Sydney music scene.

As Director of Music at St. James' Church in the city, he has recorded his second CD with the St. James' Choir who feature some of his compositions. He has also recorded a CD, to be released by ABC Classics later this year, of music for organ and trumpet with John Foster from the Sydney Symphony Orchestra. David appeared as organist with the Sydney Symphony and the Sydney Philharmonia Choirs in no less than four concerts during the year. He also performed with the Song Company in the Sydney Town Hall. This last year has seen him perform with the Allegri Singers in Bathurst and a solo concert at the Pilgrim Church in Adelaide. David performed with a brass ensemble, playing on the new organ in Sydney Grammar School, and this year will play a solo recital for the School's annual Bach Festival in June.

The choir 'Cantilation', recorded two of David's compositions for their 2004 Christmas CD on which he also played the organ. Last July, at the concert to mark the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the organ at the Sydney Opera House he played solo and conducted the St. James' Choir.

Christmas shoppers at David Jones Elizabeth Street store also enjoy the fruits of David's labours as he rehearses and conducts the store Carol Choir each year.

In College life, David continues his involvement with the annual production of 'Victoriana!'. The 2004 season saw him accompany the entire show on the piano; a feat not performed for at least 20 years! It was a particular joy for him to play for two friends and Old Pauline's weddings last year; namely Simon Crossley-Meates (former Victoriana! Producer) and Hamish Milne (former Sub-Warden).

The musical ability of College men varies greatly from year to year, but there is usually a nucleus of fine players of a variety of instruments in residence and these men have David's encouragement to perform to small audiences in the Rogers Room or to join the Intercoll Orchestra or play outside the College. The standing of music of all types in College has reached new heights during David's time as Director of Music and his friendly, easy manner and involvement in practically all aspects of College life enables him to move with ease from the bowels of the Salisbury cellar to his eyrie in the Albert Wing, weaving his musical magic into the Pauline tapestry. He will be directing the music and performing in a number of sesquicentenary concerts and functions at College in 2006.

The musical world of Sydney also keeps David busy, but another overseas tour is being organized for 2007 when he will perform in France and England and also enjoy some of the Rugby World Cup!

## THE HUNT FOR HENRY HOSE

The Rev'd Henry Judge Hose MA (Cantab.) was a person of several unique features in the history of St Paul's College. He was the first person appointed Warden of the College.

He is also the only person to have been Warden, Acting Warden or Vice Warden whose likeness (portrait, photograph or other) the College does not possess.

Harvard University has long desired to honour its founder with an imposing statue of him. However, no one has the slightest idea what John Harvard looked like, and the proud statue of him in the grounds of that esteemed institution is modeled (Harvard spelling!) on an unknown person.

We cannot bring ourselves to dabble in such deception and therefore, as part of the lead-up to next year's Sesqui-Centenary Celebrations at the College, the organising committee would like to announce a competition. Can you find a likeness of Henry J. Hose and arrange to acquire a reproduction of it for the College records? There is no prize for winning – as such; just the esteem and glory that will attach to a successful outcome.

Since Hose spent his entire life in the UK, save for his time at College [Dec. 1856 – Dec. 1861], those in the UK or planning a visit there will most likely be best placed to succeed in this hunt. Think of all the forcibly retired foxhunters you could recruit!

*Some biographical details may help:*

The Rev'd Henry Judge Hose born c. 1835

Educated at City of London School (a day school) and Trinity College, Cambridge (MA).

His academic speciality was mathematics; he wrote "Elements of Euclid, with exercises", a text published by G.Bell and Sons. He served as a mathematics schoolmaster at Westminster School.

While he was ordained an Anglican priest (?studied 1853-55), he was clearly a teacher by profession.

Aged 30, he was selected by a panel in England for the position of first Warden of St Paul's.

He arrived in Sydney on 11 December 1856.

After returning to the United Kingdom, he was:

Assistant Minister at Dulwich in 1865;

Mathematics Master at Derby Grammar School 1867-74;

Principal, the new church College (?St. M.) at Conway in Wales 1874-76; and finally

Assistant Minister at Bishop-Stortford, Herts., from 1879 until his death (16 June, 1883).

Family may well have survived him. On his famous excursion to Manly on the ferry *Phantom* (12 May 1860), he was accompanied by his small son.

As one who took 16 seats from the Liberals in 1969, and gained government in 1972, he was well qualified as mentor to Mark Latham in last year's election campaign. Mark certainly lacked Gough's striking good looks – "Divinely tall, and more divinely dark and handsome..." *The Pauline, 1942* - but the election outcome showed he had probably not listened very attentively to his mentor.

**Andrew Lark** (1970-72) was the occupational medical specialist consulted by the National Gallery in the wake of five of its security guards being diagnosed with cancer since 1997.

**Andrew Refshaug** (1968-70) became State Treasurer of NSW after a cabinet reshuffle in January.

**Emeritus Professor Peter Davies** (1946) is still working more or less full time at the Institute of Sound and Vibration Research at Southampton University. He has led the group since 1957 and has seen it grow from 3 to almost 400. He still looks after his office, laboratory, post graduate and post doctoral assistants as well as AU\$1.8M of research grants.

**Honourable Justice Jerrold Cripps** (1950-55) who had a "stellar career at the bar, becoming one of the State's youngest QCs", later distinguished himself on the bench. Recently he has been appointed Independent Commissioner Against Corruption. As Assistant Commissioner he served in two previous ICAC investigations: Operation Jommelli which investigated a car rebirthing racket, and Operation Meteor which looked into allegations by a National Parks and Wildlife Service whistleblower.

**AUSTRALIA DAY HONOURS 2005**

**The Hon Mr Justice Terence Cole RFD QC (1955-59) AO** for services to the judiciary, reform of the building construction industry, Naval Reserve, conservation and the arts.

**Dr William McNeil (1994-95) OAM** for service through the provision of immediate medical assistance to victims of the bombings which occurred at Bali on 12<sup>th</sup> October 2002 .

**The Rev'd Roy Wotton (Council 1971-87) OAM** for service to the Anglican Church of Australia particularly through the pastoral care of veterans and their families.

**Emeritus Professor Ray Stalker (1950-53)** was made an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) last year. After finishing his PhD in 1958 he went to Canada and worked at the National Research Council in Ottawa where he developed an interest in flight at very high velocities (hypervelocity aerodynamics). After a year at the National Physical Laboratory in England he returned to Australia as a lecturer at the ANU where he formed a research group, introducing a new type of wind tunnel which increased the velocities that could be achieved in wind tunnels. Wind tunnels of this type are now in use throughout the world. In 1977 he became Professor of Mechanical Engineering at Queensland Univ and founded a research group interested in very high speed flight engines which has led to the successful "Hyshot" flight of the world's first scramjet engine ("...not my doing, but the work of the very talented younger men who have succeeded me." *Prof Stalker*). Ray has been made a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science, a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Technological Science and a Fellow of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics.

**James Watson (1993-96)** moved to London with Reckitt Benckiser in January and has just announced his engagement (see list above). He is planning an October wedding.

**Hugh Watson (1995-99)** married Megan Drury in 2001, both returning to work at the United Nations in New York two weeks after September 11. In 2003, both gained their LLMs in International Law at Cambridge, returning to Australia to complete their College of Law before joining the Department of Foreign Affairs in Canberra at the start of 2004. They are to be posted to Tokyo in 2007.

**Jim Munro (1966-68)** has been involved in OHS for some years as an engineer and manager with particular reference to plant safety and the use of electrical equipment in hazardous areas. Last year he left Workcover to establish his own consultancy business, much of which is overseas, involving a new international product certification scheme.

His latest task in South-East Asia, following the tsunami, has been described as the largest ever forensic mission, and by Griffiths as "mind boggling". "Just imagine having 1,000 bodies lying in front of you...you try to switch off as much as you can...by the time you fingerprint them and a pathologist looks at them and tries to work out sex and age and scars and tattoos, and then we look at them and then the DNA samples..it takes about an hour and a half for an individual...multiply that by the number of bodies! Families get impatient, but certainty is the key."
