

Eric Knight Rhodes Scholar 2007

The Rhodes Scholarship shortlist of 12 included three current Paulines from which **Eric Knight** emerged as the winner of one of the two Australia at Large scholarships for 2007. He will read for a Masters of Science in Environmental Change and Management degree at Magdalen College, Oxford where his academic supervisor will be Professor JAC Smith. Taught at the Environmental Change Institute at Oxford University, a specialist research institute in environmental issues, the degree is an interdisciplinary course investigating future environmental policy from a scientific, economic and legal perspective, which is a natural progression from his interest in social justice and global issues in ecology and the environment. At the moment he is working as a lawyer for the international law firm, Baker & McKenzie.

Ollie Jones, who topped the class list in final year law and took out a University Medal, has been awarded a prestigious Commonwealth Scholarship and the inaugural Peter Cameron Sydney Oxford Scholarship. He will be undertaking the BCL degree at Exeter College, Oxford. Currently he is working in the litigation department of Mallesons. After being admitted as a Solicitor in July he will travel to Oxford via Tibet and the Everest Advanced Base Camp. After Oxford he will either practise in London or return to the Sydney Bar. Chemistry Medal winner, **Anthony Phillips**, has taken up a three-year External Research Studentship at Trinity College, Cambridge (one of six full scholarship awarded each year by the College). He will be undertaking his PhD studies into the interaction of various crystals with light at the Cavendish Laboratory under Dr Jacqui Cole. This type of research poses a significant technical challenge, as the interactions take place in fractions of a second while it normally takes hours to collect enough data to determine a crystal structure. After his PhD, he will be looking for a post-doctoral position at one of the big centralised research facilities leading in the longer term to an academic career.

Andrew Wilson Medallist in Biomedical Engineering, has moved away from engineering into management consulting and has recently taken up a position with Bain & Company. His undergraduate research, undertaken at and for ResMed Inc., aimed to optimise the performance and noise emissions of a prototype motor for use in CPAP devices for the treatment of sleep apnoea. His findings had significant practical consequences and resulted in ResMed applying for a patent relating to that work. After an injury playing Rawson Cup soccer last year he has had to take a break from competitive rowing and is instead in the process of planning his wedding to ex-Women's College student, Alice Cochrane. Fourth medal winner, **Nik Kirby**, who wrote his thesis on 'Contemporary Pragmatism. Conversation between Philosophy and Life', has moved from the contemplative to the active life and, as well as being an extraordinarily active Secretary of the Students' Club, is completing his Law degree. It will be interesting to see how his philosophical background will influence his growing engagement with the 'real' world.

Other awards and plans for overseas study:

Among those who completed their undergraduate degrees in 2006 a number of Paulines will be moving into postgraduate studies overseas.

Gerald Teng, currently completing his honours thesis on information entropy of DNA, has received offers from a number of leading American universities. He has accepted a place at Stanford University where he will do a Masters degree in Management, Science and Engineering in which he will look at the industrial and financial applications of mathematical modelling. Having completed his law degree with first class honours,

Paddy Meagher, will continue his studies at New York University where he has been accepted into the LLM programme. He is currently travelling in the Carribean, after a very successful culmination to his university debating career at the World University Debating Championship at Vancouver where his partnership with fellow Pauline Chris Croke gained 4th place and he was ranked 4th best speaker over all.

Nick Goodhew (1994-97) who has always wanted to be a dentist, has been accepted into Griffith University, Southport QLD, to study dentistry.

St Paul's and Women's Colleges joint project in Cambodia.

THE 'LUCKY COUNTRY' HELPS NEEDY NEIGHBOURS.

In late November, twelve Paul's and Women's residents travelled to Cambodia to work with the Tabitha Foundation, a non-profit organisation active in Cambodia since 1994. The group helped with the house building component of the Tabitha program, and through the generous donations of those who went on the trip, Women's College and St Paul's College Students' Club, the team was able to gather enough funds to support the construction of six homes. The adventure began with a fairly rigorous immunisation program. Many thanks go to Vince Braniff, team member and in-house doctor, for arranging vaccinations and scripts for the trip.

The group flew into Phnom Penh's mid-morning humidity and frantic 'moto' setting. For many on the trip this was their first time to a third world country; at first confronting, yet ultimately rewarding and eye-opening.

A dusty, ramshackle world surrounded our air-conditioned bus that was our transport for the next few days. After an extensive brief on the chequered history of Cambodia, and of our particular project, from Tabitha's founder Janne Ritskes, the team went about preparing for the following few days of house construction. The afternoon visit to the Toul Sleng Genocide Museum dramatically cemented the gravity of the recent past of this fascinating country.

The following morning we travelled South from the city for 1 ½ hours and arrived at the province of Kompong Speu and the village of Ang Karalang where we were based for the next few days. The houses were roughly two meters off the ground, held up by stilts with a peaked iron roof. With no other instructions apart from "here is a hammer and nails", the team went about the process of construction. Nails were bent, thumbs hit and timber split, but it was not long until a system of teamwork was formed and the houses came together very efficiently. The odd break for water and a bite to eat gave us all time to take in our surroundings. Dripping with sweat and often parched, many of us felt as though we were on show. Dark, beady eyes stared in amazement as white figures struggled in the heat. Needless to say, we were equally fascinated with the people we were helping, and over the next few days relationships founded on hand signals and facial expressions were built. By the conclusion of our few day's work it was clear that both

the people of the Ang Karalang village and the men and women of Paul's and Women's had gained an enormous amount, both physically and emotionally, from the experience.

Before heading north to Siem Reap we took in the sights of the Imperial Palace, the Killing Fields (which, like the Toul Sleng museum were deeply moving) and visited the local markets, where many of the girls went a little crazy and sampled local Khmer foods such as deep-fried spiders and other Khmer delicacies. Of course the night at the Heart of Darkness will be fondly remembered by all, along with cocktails on the Mekong.

We then travelled some five hours north by boat up the Tonle Sap river, passing through narrow, winding tidal river waters opening into the Tonle Sap lake which was dotted with fishing nets and nomadic floating villages. Many on the boat took the opportunity to soak up a little South-East Asian sun, putting the *daxys* (Ed note: Old Jungle Saying for ???) to the test, or catching-up on some rest.

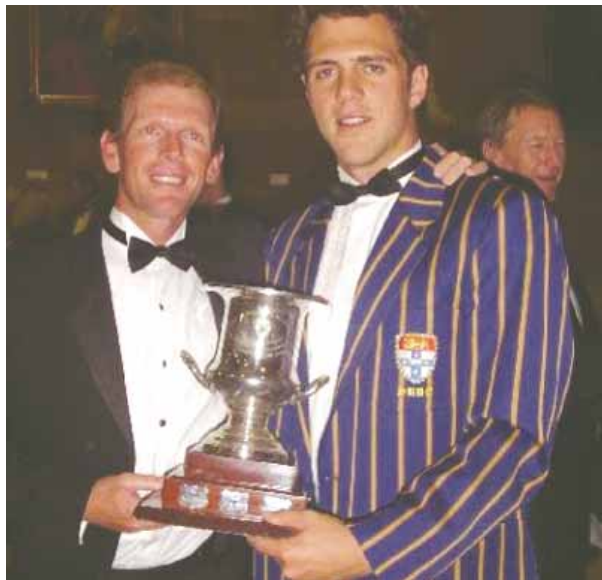
We arrived at the Siem Reap 'port' where a bartered Tuk Tuk took us to our accommodation. Touristy Siem Reap had all the trappings of a tourist town with ATM's, massage parlors and diverse cuisines. One comes to Siem Reap to see the ruins of the Angkor Empire, a 1000 kilometer square urban settlement which lasted some 500-600 years. It is a mind-blowing collection of vast and varied stone and laterite temples. Over the next couple of days the group independently made their way around the Grand Tour circuit by pushbike, moto or Tuk Tuk's.



I wish to thank Pip Moorehead from the Women's College who put enormous work into this and got the ball rolling. The relationship between the Colleges and Tabitha should continue. I hope that Paul's men take the initiative to continue to create something similar to this trip – challenging the all-too-easy claustrophobia of well-heeled institutional life.

CRICKET

The College cricket team won its third successive title, beating St Andrew's in the final by seven wickets. St Paul's demolished every side it came up against.

The team, lead by its courageous captain **William Hay**, wasn't challenged in accounting for St Johns by 8 wickets, Wesley by 160 runs and St Andrews by 5 wickets. In the second match (against Wesley) great bowling from veteran **Nick Dunford** and wicket keeping from freshman **Harrison Gould** put Paul's in a commanding position. Captain Will Hay scored an impressive 137 to send Paul's into the final.

The highlight of the campaign was the clinical routing of a much hyped St Andrews team in the final. The result was never in doubt as **Charlie Caban** took 2 wickets with the first two balls of the match, disposing of Drew's two best batsmen with fast, in-swinging deliveries. From there on it was a matter of time before Paul's clinched the match and the title. This year's competition has also unearthed some healthy talent for future years. **Harrison Gould** starred in the Wesley match scoring 47 and hitting some big sixes straight down the ground. **Jeremy Rose** managed to keep it all on and take 4 wickets in his Rawson debut while **Toby L'Estrange** looked stylish all the way. **Charlie Crane** bowled with fire and accuracy and was ably supported in the field with the continuous banter of **Andrew Mckillop** and **Mark Draper**.

ROWING

Under ideal conditions on the Olympic Course at Penrith Paul's, coached by Robbie Williams, won the Intercol Boat Race for the eighth consecutive year in the impressive time of 6min 6.77 sec, three clear boat lengths ahead of Wesley, John's and Andrew's who had a close race for second place. There were five freshers in our crew and one of them, **Cameron Girdlestone**, has since been selected to row for Australia in the World Under 23 Rowing Championships to be held in Scotland in July.
