Location:	Residing (at a minimum during University Semester periods) and working at St Paul's College, 9 City Road, Camperdown, NSW 2050
Objective:	To deputise for the Warden and take responsibility for overseeing, supporting, and providing effective leadership of the residential life of St Paul's College as a respectful, dynamic, safe and inclusive academic community. The Vice Warden should be an active and approachable presence in College life, regularly involved in student and community activities.
Specific Accountabilities:	Supporting the Warden with the effective leadership, management and administration of the College – with particular responsibility for the residential life of the community. Specific responsibilities include: • To be a member of the senior management team of the College, contributing to the strategic direction and management of the College. • To implement the College. • To implement the College's strategy including that the vision, values and graduate attributes are achieved • Working closely with other staff, to promote St Paul's College as a preferred destination for students of diverse backgrounds from metropolitan and non-metropolitan NSW, inter-state, and overseas. • Oversee and manage the residential life of the College in conjunction with the Deans of both the undergraduate and graduate communities. • To lead the residential staff team in a collaborative and effective way. • To work closely with and mentor student leaders. • Get to know and provide pastoral care for students across the College in collaboration with the other student facing staff. • Be actively involved in the daily life of the College, maintaining a visible and approachable presence within the student and wider College community, including through having most meals in Hall and supporting student activities.



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	 To engage with all students in the community Working closely with the Senior Tutor and Registrar, to ensure the academic ethos of the College is strong, with effective academic support to help students achieve their academic potential. To support cultural, sporting, intellectual, spiritual, community service and social activities within the College. Working closely with the Deans, Chaplain, Senior Tutor, Peer Support Leaders, and others, to ensure effective pastoral care of the College. To uphold the Anglican ethos of the College whilst supporting students of diverse faiths and of none. Working with relevant staff, to ensure the appropriate handling of discipline issues within the College, including adherence to the Code of Conduct and other student-related policies. Working with Deans to ensure College events are risk managed appropriately, overseeing the logistics and ensuring the preservation of College assets. Participation in the recruitment and selection of outstanding students for the College Support and encourage collegiality between the College's undergraduate and graduate communities. To contribute to alumni and other stakeholder engagement including some advancement (fundraising) activities. To represent the College and the Warden in various contexts (including within the wider University and with other colleges) as requested by the Warden.
